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

World Premiere

We are delighted to open this year's festival with the World Premiere of Tearepa Kahi's film *Muru*.

Set against the backdrop of the stunning Tühoe native bush, writer and director Tearepa Kahi (*Poi E: The Story of Our Song NZIFF 2016, Herbs: Songs of Freedom NZIFF 2019, Mt Zion*) plunges us into one of the most charged episodes of Aotearoa's history: the Tühoe raids of 15 Oct 2007.

True to Kahi's masterful commitment to centering Indigenous narratives, the film's heartbeat is held by the locals. Community Sergeant 'Taffy' Tawharau (Cliff Curtis) has returned home to care for his ailing father. In addition to shuttling the local tamariki to kura and getting kaumātua to their medical check-ups, he must also contend with the rebellious but loveable teenager, Rusty (Poroaki Merritt-McDonald) also recently returned home – but from six months in a Youth Corrections Facility.

Against this backdrop of whānau and whenua, the police armed offenders squad descends on the sleepy town of Rūātoki – on a school day. Invoking New Zealand's new antiterrorism laws, the manhunt begins for Tūhoe activist, Tame Iti (who plays himself), the alleged mastermind behind a potential political uprising and ringleader of military-style training camps in Te Urewera.

The action is fast, the cinematography laser-focused, and the drama rapidly spirals into chaos as the police grow desperate to find their man. The film is superbly edited, shining a spotlight on each individual's humanity: the innocent families whose homes were ransacked, the children left alone for hours on end, as well as the members of the police who are forced to make life-changing decisions. This is a big-screen action flick that skilfully avoids veering into the didactic, and its distinctive lightness of touch is an ode to Merata Mita and her oeuvre.

Muru is a clear reminder: there will always be taniwha. Some will have eight legs and two heads. Others will be harder to spot. But there will always be those who are ready to fight the taniwha to create greater understanding for the future of Aotearoa. — Dione Joseph



Triangle of Sadness

Closing Night



We are excited to close this year's edition with the latest film by social satirist supreme Ruben Östlund - his fourth title to play in NZIFF, and the second to have won the Palme d'Or.

After skewering the contemporary art world in The Square (NZIFF 2017), the Swedish director focuses his excoriating gaze on fashion, influencers and the ultra-rich in his English-language debut. Outrageously entertaining and unapologetically in-your-face, Triangle of Sadness divided critics and audiences at its Cannes world premiere but left no one indifferent.

This frontal assault on the superficiality of current times, capitalism, class, masculine insecurity, coupledom, social media and a whole lot else besides, roundly compensates for its lack of subtlety by its uproarious panache and shrewd underlying commentary, taking excruciating comedy to new heights.

Yaya and Carl, surfacebeautiful and deeply shallow, are models - when they can get a gig. In the absence of catwalk strutting, Yaya constantly maintains her Instagram profile while Carl frets about the imbalance in their relationship - she earns more than he does, but she never picks up the swank restaurant tab. Are they a couple or just performing so as to boost the number of 'likes' from their social media followers? Bickering doesn't

sort anything out, but fortunately Yaya is offered a free trip on a super yacht. They may be the poorest among its grotesquely rich denizens, but unexpected circumstances mean Carl's 'hotness' factor will become more valuable than any other wares that can be traded. — Sandra Reid

"Östlund's wickedly funny Englishlanguage follow-up to The Square features none of the same characters as his 2017 Palme d'Or winner but employs much the same tactic of creating deeply uncomfortable situations for people more than comfortable with their privilege. It's a Buñuelian strategy, à la The Discreet Charm of the Bourgeoisie, of which Östlund has become art cinema's foremost practitioner. His operating theory here, floated amid arguments about capitalism and Karl Marx, is that beauty itself is a form of currency, albeit an incredibly volatile and fickle one, like crypto, that can crash at any time... Östlund makes you laugh, but he also makes you think. There's a meticulous precision to the way he constructs, blocks and executes scenes - a kind of agonizing unease, amplified by awkward silences or an unwelcome fly buzzing

between characters struggling to communicate. First The Square, then Triangle. No matter what sphere he tackles, we're bound to see the world differently." - Peter Debruge, Variety

Decision to Leave

Heojil kyolshim



While investigating a possible murder case, a detective who employs idiosyncratic investigative methods becomes infatuated with the dead man's beguiling widow – and potential killer – in this lush, mesmerising murder-mystery, with shades of Hitchcock's *Vertigo*, from South Korean virtuoso and NZIFF favourite Park Chan-wook, winner of Best Director at Cannes 2022.

Handsome and happily married ace police detective Hae-joon works the homicide squad in bustling Busan. His wife's job in the distant seaside town of Ipo means they mainly live apart. Her absence makes things easier when Hae-joon, an insomniac, spends his nights on stakeouts —

although the latter are few and far between, given the lack of murders to investigate. All that changes when a man's body is found at the base of a mountain and Hae-joon encounters the defunct man's wife, enigmatic and striking Seo-rae. Curious about her blithe attitude regarding her husband's death, Hae-joon stakes out her apartment – and continues to do so, long after Seo-rae has ceased to be a suspect... — Sandra Reid

Fire of Love



"There are only so many times you can shout 'woah!' at yourself during one film, but this documentary about two French daredevil volcano chasers pushes that number up. Maurice and Katia Krafft spent the 70s and 80s married both to each other and to the pursuit of being right there in the heat of the action whenever a volcano turned lethal. Maurice was a geologist, Katia was a chemist, but they were both volcanologists, dedicated to understanding these explosive natural phenomena. which they decided could only really be classified two ways: they were either 'red' (obvious lava flows, less dangerous) or 'grey' (more like bombs, less fiery, but more murderous)...

A dreamy voiceover from Miranda July guides us through the Kraffts' story, as directed by Sara Dosa, who creates a powerful tribute to obsession and to how tiny and powerless we are in the face of geological time and power. The star is the footage: the Kraffts were filmmakers as well as scientists. They popularised (and funded) their missions through the otherworldly imagery they brought down from the mountains. That means that we're privy to staggering scenes of the pair in silhouette next to explosive lava - scenes which we could easily think were computer generated if we didn't know better." - Dave Calhoun, Time Out

Inspired by his own childhood and teenage friendships, Lukas Dhont explores the fragility of adolescent bonds between two best friends in this intimate and heart-rending drama that followed its Cannes 2022 Grand Prix award with Best Film at Sydney Film Festival 2022

On a bright summer's day, 13-year-old Léo and Rémi run wild in the floral wonderland of Léo's family farm. Hunting imaginary foes or chasing each other, dashing around on their bikes or discussing their hopes and dreams during sleepovers, they share an untroubled closeness and are rarely out of each other's company When they start secondary school after the summer holidays, this intense bond and the boys' affectionate

interaction doesn't go unnoticed by their classmates, who are curious as to whether these newcomers are 'together'. The anxiety this unwanted attention generates leads Léo to pursue activities that exclude Rémi, who grapples to understand his friend slowly pulling away, and the unbearable severing of their relationship. — Sandra Reid

Lost Illusions

Illusions perdues



Lucien, an idealistic young poet, harbours ambitions reaching well beyond the borders of provincial France and his family's small printing business. Stirred by the attentions, both financial and sexual, of a wealthy patron, Louise de Bargeton, he soon finds himself catapulted into the dizzying bustle of Paris. Here his great expectations and brazen social climbing clash with reality: poetry falls by the wayside as the parvenu swiftly learns to peddle his prose to the highest bidder: he will love, suffer and survive his illusions. — Sandra Reid

The Good Boss

El buen patrón



Benevolent patriarch Julio Blanco, CEO of a family company manufacturing precision industrial scales, is determined to win a prestigious business award. In a few days' time, the national committee deciding the award outcome will come to inspect the premises. Everything must be perfect - Julio, risking his own sanity, will ensure that it is, no matter who he must seduce and destroy.

'Don't treat me like a boss' Blanco keeps telling people with a thin gray smile. You shudder to think how fast it would vanish if you did anything but. We first encounter him giving a smarmy pep talk to the employees at his company... All smiles and handshakes and repeated mentions of community, it's a performance for

the benefit of a local journalist.

Once the visitors are gone, however... a little harsh housekeeping. Among various downsizing measures, longtime employee Jose is summarily dismissed, and doesn't take it well... Following the success of Waru (NZIFF 2017) and Vai (2019), the trilogy completes with Kāinga, with under-represented Asian filmmakers crafting eight unique stories chronicling the diverse, ever-changing experiences of Asians trying to make Aotearoa New Zealand their home.

A Chinese woman arrives with a suitcase to 11 Rua Road in 1972, and the house witnesses many different lives throughout the decades: a young Japanese mother, a Filipino nurse, a Korean girl, an Indian woman trying to connect back home, a young Iranian wife, a Tamil Eelam sister in search of memories and a Chinese-Kiwi mother in the present day.

Kāinga powerfully chronicles the challenges of the immigrant experience in Aotearoa New Zealand across diverse Asian communities: family separation, building a new life while missing the old, and being viewed as "The Other," no matter how Kiwi you are and how long New Zealand has been your home.

Parental pressure, sexual perplexity and small-town bigotry are the simmering undercurrents of Kiwi filmmaker Welby Ings' beautifully shot feature debut, featuring Oscar-nominee Tim Roth.

Seventeen-year-old Jim (Jordan Oosterhof) has his sights on professional boxing glory under the relentless tutelage of his alcoholic father (Roth), but his path to hometown sporting heroism is unexpectedly complicated when the young boxer begins to fall for outcast takatāpui Māori schoolmate, Whetu (Conan Hayes).

The young pair's relationship of self-discovery threatens to take them beyond parental disapproval or career derailment, when the spectre of homophobia violently punctures the rural town's sepia-hued facade of

tolerance. Shot against the black sand backdrop of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland's West Coast beaches, *Punch* presents a vision of rural Aotearoa New Zealand life in which parochial attitudes and nostalgic aesthetics sit discordantly alongside modern youth culture and progressive ideals.

Roth may be the celebrity draw here, but it is the compelling performances of the young leads that propel this rustic coming-of-age tale. Between the local sporting politics, high school complexities and social suffocation of country life, *Punch* tells a story that is both intimately specific to Aotearoa and as universal as the youthful yearning for liberation. — Adrian Hatwell

Gloriavale



The closed doors of the Gloriavale Christian Community are forcefully assailed in this probing documentary, which follows a team of survivors and supporters on their crusade to bring the West Coast cult's true nature to light. A heady mix of exposé and legal drama, with flourishes of espionage and heart-rending confessionals, the film makes an impassioned case against an organisation steeped in allegations of coercion, oppression and abuse.

Directed by Noel Smyth and Fergus Grady (Camino Skies), the documentary introduces brother and sister John and Virginia, escapees fighting to free the rest of their family from the organisation's grasp. Home video footage from their youth gives

the audience a rare glimpse inside the daily operations of Gloriavale, while their interviews recount a harrowing lifestyle of servitude, exploitation and sexual abuse. Meanwhile, an eclectic team of lawyers, investigators and campaigners wage a strategic battle against the wealthy organisation through the court system, in the face of seemingly ambivalent powers that be.

This first-hand experience of life inside Gloriavale is devastatingly told. The transgressions of the church leadership and complicity of inactive state forces fall squarely in the film's crosshairs, but it is the humanity of the victims and courage of the survivors that elevate this poignant investigation. — Adrian Hatwell

Geoff Dixon: Portraits of Us



Glenis Giles and Clare O'l eary's documentary invites us into the magnificently cluttered studio of Aotearoa New Zealand artist Geoff Dixon as he prepares works for his next exhibition, transforming children's toys and hard enamel paint into surreal collages of spacecraft and birdlife.

Living in Cairns alongside his partner, Aboriginal artist, Arone Meeks, the Bluff-born Dixon has long held a fascination with endangered birds. Southland's own takahē often feature prominently in his work alongside many other threatened species as a metaphor for the destruction of the natural world.

The film unravels Dixon's past growing up in Nelson and his formative years at art school in Christchurch where he met fellow artist Euan Macleod -

dissecting his seemingly contradictory obsessions with science fiction, space travel nature and extinction which have shaped his unique artistic style and vision.

His work is both confronting and celebratory, revelling in the marvellous splendour of the natural world while also mourning its seemingly inevitable loss; as he describes, the works are a "portrait of us" and an unnerving look into the future. — Michael McDonnell

When the Cows Come Home



Veteran independent documentarymaker Costa Botes (Forgotten Silver Act of Kindness NZIFF 2015 Angie NZIFF 2018) returns to NZIFF with an observational documentary charting the unusual life of musician, journalist, artist and cow whisperer, Andrew Johnstone.

Opening on the Johnstone family farm in Cambridge, When the Cows Come Home introduces audiences to Tilly and Maggie, a pair of cows Johnstone has befriended and subsequently saved from slaughter. The garrulous herdsman is enthusiastic to expound his views on animal husbandry, bovine communication, and the vagaries of life in general, before the film walks us back through the events that

have shaped the singular farmerphilosopher.

From personal family tragedy to warring with Catholic school authorities, innovating in Hamilton's nascent music scene to creating querrilla art installations: Johnstone's life has had a truly idiosyncratic trajectory. Mental health issues may have seen him retreat to life on the farm, but the film makes clear its subject's restless inquisitiveness is far from being put out to pasture.

Interviewing family and friends involved in the various phases of Johnstone's evolution, it seems as though Botes, himself a one-man production company, has found a kindred spirit in this offbeat bohemian polymath. - Adrian Hatwell

Using information discarded as "invalid data" by geoscientists, media artist Grayson Cooke and composer Dugal McKinnon concoct a full spectrum audio-visual experience of a continent's shifting weather systems in *Path* 99.

Geoscience Australia's "Digital Earth Australia" satellite-imaging platform uses satellite data to track environmental change over time, employing complex algorithms to filter clouds from the data and obtain a clear picture of the Earth from 700km into space. The filmmakers have taken that rejected cloud data, animated and presented it in time-lapse format, bolstered by a multi-channel electronic soundtrack, to be projected as an immersive full-dome planetarium show.

The result is a remarkable representation of the cloud layer of Australia down Path 99, an orbit of the Landsat 8 satellite that passes directly down the centre of the country.

Roiling cloud systems, stormfronts, downpours and droughts are given life in a cinematic experience that goes beyond human perception.

Filmed in the lush forests and spartan hill country of Northland, Woodenhead conjures a unique, fairytale-like realm. Gert, an innocent rubbish-dump worker, is charged with the task of delivering Princess Plum, the ethereal daughter of his master Hugo, to her wedding in Maidenwood. Their journey through the grandeur of New Zealand's landscape is beset with strange events.

With composer and sound designer Marc Chesterman, Habicht pre-recorded the entire soundtrack before commencing shooting, only then inviting the actors to perform to the score. Quirky, elegant, and sexy, Woodenhead creates an imaginative world in which artfully measured

explorations of humanity, nature and creativity take place – from the base and profane to the grand and sublime.

This feature debut from Auckland writer-director Tom Levesque implores us to find true connections in an increasingly unconnected world. We're introduced to twentysomething Sierra, living in Auckland alone, working in that most thankless job of street charity fundraiser which demands a vivid personality beyond her reserved demeanour. It doesn't help that she has trouble sleeping, and after being forced to look for help, a doctor recommends that she investigate sound therapy, specifically autonomous sensory meridian response or ASMR.

Exploring online, Sierra discovers local ASMR streamer Kate who soon becomes her virtual evening companion whenever she needs help getting to sleep. Before long, Sierra starts to see Kate as an escape from her lonely existence and the traumas that haunt her – their connection starts to move offline. As Sierra is drawn deeper into Kate's life her obsession grows increasingly physical, and when faced with losing Kate to a competing lover, an act of desperation threatens to change Sierra's life forever.

Levesque's vibrant vérité direction and rhythmic editing brings Auckland after-dark to life while young actresses Millie Van Kol and Sarah May impress as polar opposites with magnetic chemistry. For generations, Quimet Solé's family has spent every summer harvesting peaches in their orchard in Alcarràs Catalonia. Their landlords, the wealthy Pinyol family, gifted them the land in gratitude for saving their lives during the Spanish Civil War land which now provides a livelihood for the sprawling Solé clan. More importantly, their identity is rooted in this soil that has been nurtured from father to son. But eviction looms: Quimet's father Rogelio never got the land deeds in writing, for back then people kept their word. Now, the Pinyol heir, Joaquim, intends to install solar panels on the property. Fruit prices are so low as to make production unsustainable; solar farms are the future. Some members of the

Solé family agree, further enraging Quimet, as siblings and spouses and rebellious teenage offspring clash.

Oblivious to the rifts forming and the family's peril, six-year-old Iris and her twin cousins continue to delight in the orchard's groves, their imaginations transforming this playground into other worlds. Like the rest of the non-professional cast, they are superb, observed with an unsentimental, deeply empathetic eye in this transfixing ensemble piece with shades of Chekhov. — Sandra Reid

The Blue Caftan

Set in the medina of a small Moroccan town and built around an emotional triangle between a middle-aged couple and a younger man that subverts expectations. Marvam Touzani's (Adam NZIFF 2019) superbly acted and deeply resonant drama is as impeccably crafted as the exquisite eponymous caftan tailored by its protagonist.

Business is hardly booming in the small garment shop run by Mina and her husband Halim. The bespoke cutting and artistic embroidery that Halim, a master tailor, specialises in requires hours of work and is therefore expensive. It is also slow and clients grow impatient. Despite former apprentices failing to meet Halim's exacting standards, he hopes that Youssef, a new recruit, will show more dedication to this increasingly unfashionable art. Youssef's presence initially perturbs, for Halim's true sexuality is hidden and although Mina is aware of her husband's secret life. the attraction between Halim and Youssef upsets their long-established. supportive marital equilibrium. But, as the couple confront Mina's ill-health. emotional dynamics deepen and all three grow to rely on each other more and more. — Sandra Reid

The Passengers of the Night

"It's May 10, 1981, and Paris is celebrating. 


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Stars at Noon



In a steamy tropical reverie, Margaret Qualley stars as a journalist moonlighting as a sex worker, who is stranded in Nicaragua and sees a handsome English businessman (played by Joe Alwyn) as her chance to escape.

"A slow-motion erotic thriller whose sexiness swirls off the screen like a bank of humidity in the tropics, shortening your breath and clinging to your clothes. Stars at Noon was adapted from the 1986 Denis Johnson novel The Stars at Noon, which has been hauled forwards to a close-to-present day of trackable smartphones and halfhearted Covid mask use.

Qualley, best known for playing Once Upon a Time in

Hollywood's young hippie Pussycat, is a revelation here, teasing out her character's flaws to the point where they become addictive to watch, and imbuing her with a sometimes-nervy, sometimes-forlorn physicality that recalls a young Juliette Binoche. Many of the film's best early passages consist of little more than watching her walk the streets of Managua to a lazily eddying improvised jazz score - perhaps Denis's Central American riff on the famous Paris-by-night scenes in Lift to the Scaffold... Denis has crafted a film that syncs your heartbeat to its own intoxicating rhythms: a full-body immersion in uneasy pleasures." - Robbie Collin, The Telegraph





The original trilogy was created through a collaboration between writerdirector Dean Fleischer-Camp and actor-writer Jenny Slate - set up as mockumentaries that see anthropomorphic snail shell Marcel being interviewed about his interests, hobbies, and some of life's big questions. Marcel was a total hit from the moment he appeared on the internet scene back in 2010 and it's magnificent to see this endearing little mollusc get his much-deserved feature-length debut in a hilarious and heartwarming story about finding connection and community, even in the smallest of corners. - NM

Framing Reality

The Territory



"Focusing on what the filmmakers call 'an island of rainforest surrounded by farms.' The Territory is a striking first feature for cinematographer Alex Pritz, as well as a notable collaborative work. Its producers include Darren Aronofsky, and its subjects, the Indigenous Urueu-wau-wau people of Brazil, helped make the film.

The documentary's title refers to a 7,000-square-mile region in the Brazilian state of Rondônia, sovereign land of the Uru-eu-wau-wau and other Indigenous groups. With a profound connection to the land, animals and rivers, they've lived there for generations, but it wasn't until 1981 that their first contact with the outside world occurred. They've been on the defensive ever since, as agribusiness,

farming, logging and ranching interests encroach upon their home. Numbering fewer than 200 and led by a forwardthinking young man, the Uru-euwau-wau became partners in Pritz's filmmaking process, shooting portions of the documentary

Pritz chronicled the group and its struggles against incursions over a three-year period beginning in 2018, the year that Jair Bolsonaro was elected president and local farmers formed an organization with aims of developing land in the protected region." - Sheri Linden, Hollywood Reporter

My Old School



"Debuting feature director Jono McLeod offers a deliciously compelling look back in bemusement at the story around Brandon Lee, a young man with whom McI eod himself went to school - at Bearsden Academy, a much sought-out secondary school in a posh suburb of Glasgow, Scotland – in 1993. Lee turned out, to put it mildly, to be not exactly who he said he was. So there's a poetic justice to having him 'played' onscreen by Scottish actor-writersinger Alan Cumming who lip-syncs immaculately to audio recordings of the real Lee.

It's a wacky, rarely used technique, notably deployed in Clio Bernard's equally off-kilter doc The Arbor (NZIFF 2010). Here it

makes sense in a story about performance and deception. Simply designed animation, modelled on the look of cool cartoons of the time such as Daria, adds an extra comic jauntiness...

These quirky comic devices also help to vary the texture throughout, given that the story is essentially told through interviews with other classmates from the same year and the few teachers who remember what happened. We'll be coy about what happened in the end so as to not spoil the fun... It created quite the mini news-media scandal back in the 90s when Lee's true identity broke." - Leslie Felperin, Hollywood Reporter

A House Made of Splinters



A dilapidated building near what was the frontline of the Eastern Ukraine battlegrounds provides shelter for children who have been temporarily removed from their homes by the state because of neglect. Here, a small and dedicated team of social workers strive to provide a loving environment for their young charges while the latter's future custody is decided by the judicial system and their parents' ability, or not, to take care of them.

The film focuses on three children, Eva, Sasha and Kolya, and follows them through the nine months the children generally remain in the refuge. Although they are unrelated their experience of traumatic familial situations, often triggered by the Russian/Ukraine conflict in the

Donbas, draws connections between their splintered lives. War and the societal breakdown and turmoil it induces may be the backdrop, but the film instead captures the children's incredible ability to discover or create magical moments despite harsh realities.

Danish director Simon Lereng Wilmont's equally haunting, Oscarshortlisted The Distant Sound of Barking Dogs (NZIFF 2017) was also filmed in Eastern Ukraine, an area he has been working in since 2015: a "part of the world that [he] has completely lost his heart to". It should be noted that as of the time of writing the children of the shelter have been evacuated to a safer area to escape the bombing threat. — Sandra Reid

Although fans will relish seeing previously unseen footage from some of the biggest matches in tennis history, being an aficionado is not a requisite to enjoying this absorbing portrait of the (formerly) infamous bad boy of tennis and one of the sport's greatest exponents, whose career played out in an era when tennis reached a peak of cultural influence and popularity.

In candid stream-of-conscious musings, John McEnroe unpicks his career and life. He also lets us tag along with him on a long night walk around his hometown of New York City. Shot in natural night light, these shadowy vignettes reflect sombre psychic spaces, as, among other things, McEnroe ponders his difficult

relationship with his domineering father, who was also once his agent, his obsessive perfectionist drive, and the lousy aspects of his behaviour on and off the court – of which we see plenty. The regret he evinces is confirmed by his wife and daughters, while Billie Jean King offers sympathetic and enlightening insight into the stress athletes of McEnroe's calibre face in the pursuit of top performance and perfection. Björn Borg, his toughest foe, turns out to be a lifelong friend. — Sandra Reid



Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time



Many years in the making, Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time proves a worthy tribute to the writer of such classic novels as Slaughterhouse Five and Breakfast of Champions, as well as a compelling introduction for the uninitiated. In harmony with Vonnegut's own self-referential style, the documentary is also an elaborately meta making-of-itself, telling the story how co-director Robert B. Weide (best known for producing and directing Curb Your Enthusiasm) first started working on the film four decades ago only to become lost to the mercy of time himself.

No one makes cinema like playful Gallic absurdist and musical magician Quentin Dupieux aka Mr Oizo, and that's a good thing. Dupieux is a cine-raconteur deep in love with the very nature of storytelling, whose work is a joyous amalgam of Buñuel, Monty Python and Spike Jonze. Prior festival hits like Deerskin (NZIFF 2019) and Mandibles (NZIFF 2021) mean we're super-confident his latest two offerings in this year's line-up will not disappoint.

For those who haven't encountered Dupieux's work, take a plunge into his mad universe with this, his latest pop concoction involving 'Tobacco Force Five', a group of snappily Daft Punk-coutoured superheroes who battle

kaiju-esque monsters with their toxic powers. Their boss, Didier, a Hugh Hefner-vibing and drooling rat-puppet, informs them that dastardly Lizardin plans on destroying earth very soon and they must go camping to get their mojo back before battling their nemesis. The film then evolves into a parody of portmanteau pics with the team sharing campfire tales, one involving a dimwit and farming equipment that is a hysterical showstopper.

This celebration of the true power of whimsy is the perfect antidote to a cold, grey antipodean winter. Unrelentingly sweet and silly, this is the best hang-out flick in the entire NZIFF – BYO heroic squad to check it out. — AT



Lovers of Scandi thrillers should be very careful what they wish for as this slow-burn, excruciating vacay from hell takes the comic discomfort of its premise to ultra-agonising levels. The setup feels familiar; two vacationing couples with kids (Danish & Dutch) meet and click. The Danes' compliant nature and fear of causing offense sees them take up an enthusiastic offer of a future catchup from the Dutch. The family dynamics couldn't be more different once the Danes. Biørn and Louise, are on the home turf of the Dutch. Patrick and Karin. The horrors of casual acquaintances suddenly realising they have nothing in common will become the meaty crux of the mind games and sadism to follow.

The film does a superb job of forensically dissecting the uneasy expectations between the couples. The clever script begins with microaggressions before the destruction of social mores and the Danes' slow realisation they might be responsible for the paralysing claustrophobia they now find themselves in. Christian Tafdrup's tight control and execution of this sick sojourn creates a defining moment of modern Danish cinema. A talented provocateur who picked up Haneke's baton and has proceeded to club baby seals with it. You've been warned. - AT

This buzzy genre outing gut-punched the Sundance crowd like a rotten pork paella left out in the Spanish sun. Expanded from Carlota Pereda's blistering award-winning short of furious female adolescence, this similarly titled feature-length follow-up should stand as the cathartic war-cry for those who have silently suffered the cruelty of teenage bullydom.

Sara, a plus-sized teen, helps her parents at their butcher shop in a remote village near the Portuguese border. The local Queen Bee, Maca, refers to Sara as Piggy and spends time being obnoxious and narcissistic with her cohorts. Sneaking away for a dip in a pool, Sara is terrorised by Maca and co, leaving her to walk home traumatised and near naked. The assault hasn't gone

unnoticed and a local hulking stranger with bad intentions has plans for Maca and her meanies. Stumbling home, Sara has another toxic encounter of the masculine kind, before finally seeing her female tormenters abducted by the hulking stranger, who is now a twisted guardian angel to Sara. When local bodies begin to pile up like choice cuts of prime rib, Sara finds herself in a rare position of power, but knowledge becomes a two-sided blade.

A non-exploitative femmefocused freakout that comes across like some blood-soaked euro-fusion of Catherine Breillat (Fat Girl NZIFF 2001) and Julia Ducournau (Titane NZIFF 2021), it heralds the arrival of Pereda as a major new talent. — AT

Resurrection



A virtuoso and nuanced performance from the always-fearless Rebecca Hall as Margaret lays the foundation for this Repulsion-esque exercise in unease and dread. Hall, a solo mum, is always in corporate beastmode; whether in the office, or in the bedroom, she is the ruling alpha. That is until David, her ex from a long-ago and traumatic acrimonious ending, slinks back into town. His stalking presence begins to fracture her 'perfect' world.

David, as played by the always on-point Tim Roth, appears innocuously enough in the periphery exuding nonchalance, that is until director Andrew Semans bequiles us via Margaret's point-of-view, giving David an unexplained demonic aura. When Margaret's quasi-bonkers version of why she escaped David's clutches is at total odds with David's more moderate explanation, we waver between believing her histrionics or supporting his possible gaslighting in full effect. When David promises her access to a son we never even knew existed, events take a turn for the worse.

At first, all of this seems a standard tale of stress and stalking cloaked in a stylish arthouse veneer - but like some disturbed metronome maker, Semans starts to tweak and tune the rhythms of our anxiety until it becomes unbearable.

Incredible but True

Incrovable mais vrai



Another spaced-out slice of cineeccentricity from Quentin Dupleux, the prolific French filmmaker whose latest film Smoking Causes Coughing is also screening in this section. Rivalling Charlie Kaufman as the modern auteur of the absurd, this Gallic gem offers a cheery twist on an enduring sci-fi trope.

Married couple Marie and Alain are hunting for a new abode and are shown an enchanting modernist property by a droll realtor who doesn't hold back regarding the single mysterious secret the house has to offer: a basement portal that can bend the fabric of time itself. Like last year's fest hit Beyond the Infinite Two Minutes, Dupieux's film juxtaposes tantalising quantum

mechanics with distinctive low-key dynamics. The portal de-ages you by 72 hours while the world around moves forward 12 hours in time. If that starts to hurt your head, don't fret. Dupieux isn't interested in confounding with a Stephen Hawking analysis of the conceit. The film is more concerned with the moral dilemmas that arise around our collective fear of decay - a wedge that opens cracks in the couple's previously harmonious relationship. The unsettling cosmic hazards of such a portal are endless, but this is a Dupieux film, and so of course we have a mechanical penis linked to a smartphone and other wild amusebouches that permeate this odd and delightful watch. - AT




